

Ghana's 2024 Elections Monitoring of Indecent Language on Radio

1.0 Introduction

This report presents findings from the daily monitoring of selected programs on nine radio stations in Ghana. The data was collected from 7th to the 30th of June 2024. It specifically cites the number of indecent expressions recorded, categorizes these expressions, and identifies the individuals who made the remarks. The indecent expressions recorded are also presented according to the radio stations where these expressions were made as well as hosts who made indecent remarks. The report concludes with recommendations for relevant stakeholders.

1.1 Background

Ghana has over the last 31 years remained relatively peaceful and democratically stable. This relative peace has received global recognition and rankings. For example, in the 2022 Global Peace Index (GPI) Report, Ghana ranked as the most peaceful country in West Africa, 2nd in Africa, and 40th in the world. This was an improvement over 2019 and 2020 rankings. However, the 2023 index saw a deep fall to 51st, 4th, and 2nd position in the world, Africa, and West Africa respectively. The fall in Ghana's peace rankings is attributable to several factors including toxic narratives that fuel polarisation mainly along partisan, ethnic, religious and chieftaincy lines as well as radicalism. Such narratives are manifested through hate speech, intemperate language, political propaganda, and mis/disinformation via radio.

Electioneering periods in Ghana are often characterised by the use of abusive and other indecent expressions against political opponents, institutions and other groups. Unfortunately, a number of radio stations allow political parties and their representatives to abuse the airwaves with little or no restraint from programme hosts and presenters. This often results in heightened political tension in the country every four years. In a pre-emptive effort to bring the phenomenon under control, the Media Foundation for West Africa (MFWA) has since 2012 been implementing the language monitoring project to monitor, report and name perpetrators of hate speech and indecent expressions on radio.

Based on lessons learnt from the 2012, 2016, and 2020 language monitoring projects, the MFWA is monitoring indecent language on radio during the 2024 electioneering period to contribute to strengthening Ghana's peace and democratic stability by fostering a national ecosystem that detest

hate speech, incitement to violence and other narratives that promote toxic polarisation; while promoting a narrative culture that advances and encourages peaceful and inclusive society as well as decent political discourse.

The project involves the daily monitoring of selected programmes on selected radio stations to track and report the use of hate speech and other indecent expressions by politicians and others who feature on the radio programmes monitored. It also assesses the performance of presenters or hosts in their moderation of programmes.

2.0 Methodology

The project involves the daily monitoring of expressions used by politicians and other actors who feature on radio programmes such as news bulletins, political discussions and current affairs discussions. It also involves assessing and reporting how presenters or hosts of selected programmes on radio stations handle their programmes and whether or not they tolerate the use of hate speech and other indecent language on their programmes. This report covers the monitoring of nine radio stations in Ghana from June 7 to June 30, 2024. The stations were selected based on findings from previous reports, perceived allegiance to or ownership by politicians or politically exposed persons, and geographical spread. Table 1 presents names and regional locations of the 9 radio stations that were monitored under the current phase of the project.

The monitoring is done based on a validated <u>monitoring instrument</u>. Nine language monitors have been recruited (one monitor per station) and trained on the use of the monitoring instrument. Each monitor is assigned a digital recorder for purposes of recording the programmes they monitor. Monitors send daily reports to the MFWA which are analysed by a team of programme staff and researchers for a consolidated report to be produced.

3.0 Findings

This report covers findings from monitoring conducted from June 7-30, 2024. We monitored over 500 radio programs, including news bulletins, as well as political and current affairs discussions aired on the nine radio stations. Altogether, we recorded 46 incidents of indecent expressions, with the majority (54.4%) captured during discussions about issues of: elections (21.7%), security (10.9%), corruption (10.9%), and development projects (10.9%). This was followed by issues related to the presidency (8.7%). Table 2 presents details of the subjects around which the violations were recorded.

3.1 Categories of Indecent Expressions Recorded




Figure 1: Categories of Indecent Expressions Recorded

Out of the 46 indecent expressions that were recorded, a greater majority (71.7%) were insulting and offensive comments. This was followed by unsubstantiated allegations (21.7%), provocative remarks (4.3%), and remarks calling for confrontation and violence – overtly or covertly (2.2%). Figure 1 below indicates the frequency of use of each type of indecent expression recorded.

3.2 Radio Stations and Incidents of Indecent Expressions

The frequency of indecent expressions recorded on all the 9 radio stations are presented in Table 3. The majority of violations (71.7%) were perpetrated on two Accra-based radio stations - Accra FM and Power FM. Specifically, Accra FM had the highest number of violations, with a total of

22. The bulk of these were insulting and offensive comments (19), followed by unsubstantiated allegations (2), and one remark calling for confrontation and violence.

Power FM recorded the second-highest number of violations, totalling 11. Most of these were insulting and offensive comments (9), along with unsubstantiated allegations (2). Like Accra FM, Power FM shows a pattern of offensive remarks and baseless accusations. Oman FM had 8 violations, with a notable distribution across categories. While it recorded fewer insulting and offensive comments (3) compared to Accra FM and Power FM, it had a higher number of unsubstantiated allegations (4).


Additionally, Oman FM had one provocative remark, indicating a varied pattern of violations. Ashh FM had 2 violations: one insulting and offensive comment, and one unsubstantiated allegation. Radio Gold recorded one violation, which was an insulting and offensive comment. Both Wontumi Radio and Angel FM (all in Kumasi) recorded one violation each, with Wontumi Radio having an unsubstantiated allegation and Angel FM having a provocative remark.



3.3. Social Media Broadcast

Almost all (43 out of 46) of the indecent violations recorded on radio were also streamed live on social media. The show hosts frequently referred listeners to the radio stations' social media handles. All 43 violations streamed live were on Facebook, and 25 of these violations were also streamed simultaneously on YouTube. This is particularly troubling because the use of social media platforms does not only offer wider coverage for spreading indecent language but also preserves these inciteful comments, perpetuating their existence and potential negative influence on the nation's peace ahead of the general elections in December 2024.





3.4 Culprits of Indecent Expressions Used on Radio

Table 4 shows the names of the individuals who authored the 46 indecent expressions. The expressions are presented according to the identified categories. Further details of the radio stations and the dates on which the categorised expressions were made are presented in the appendix of this report.

4.0 Assessment of Moderation of Programmes by Hosts

As part of the language monitoring project, moderators or hosts are assessed to find out how they conduct themselves on their respective programmes and also, how they handle their programmes to ensure that hate speech and other indecent expressions are not used on their platforms. Findings from the period under review (June 7-30, 2024) show that some moderators directly engaged in the use of indecent expressions.

Specifically, Kwabena Bobie Ansah, host of *The Citizen Show* on Accra-based Accra FM, recorded 14 violations; and Mugabe Maase, host of *Inside Politics* on Accra-based Power FM recorded 6 violations, making them the highest and third highest culprits. Hosts are expected to moderate discussions and maintain decorum, yet their significant involvement in making indecent expressions undermines this role.

5.0 Conclusion and Recommendations

This report covers findings from monitoring conducted from June 7 to 30, 2024, across nine radio stations in Ghana. Overall, 46 indecent expressions were recorded, predominantly, insulting and offensive comments during discussions on elections, security, corruption, and development projects. Accra FM and Power FM featured prominently for violations. Social media amplification of these violations on platforms like Facebook and YouTube increase the reach and potential consequences of such indecent expressions.

Hosts themselves were responsible for a significant number of violations, indicating a lapse in moderation and accountability within media outlets. Specifically, Nana Bobie Ansah, host of 'The Citizen Show' on Accra-based Accra FM, was found to be the most abusive, having made 14 indecent expressions out of the 46 recorded.

In consideration of the above findings, the MFWA makes the following recommendations:

- 1. Radio stations, particularly presenters and moderators, should maintain professionalism by refraining from indecent expressions and ensuring that their guests adhere to respectful, fact-based expressions.
- 2. Program moderators should establish and enforce clear ground rules for their shows to maintain decorum.
- **3.** The National Media Commission (NMC), the Ghana Independent Broadcasters Association (GIBA), and the Ghana Journalists Association (GJA) need to enhance regulatory and self-regulatory mechanisms to enhance media professionalism.
- 4. Political party leaders should urge their representatives, affiliates, and communicators to prioritize issue-based discussions and avoid using indecent language.
